President Obama: I put forward in the past an all-of-the-above energy strategy, but our energy strategy must be about more than just producing more oil. And, by the way, it's certainly got to be about more than just building one pipeline. Now, I know there's been, for example, a lot of controversy surrounding the proposal to build a pipeline -- the Keystone pipeline, that would carry oil from Canadian tar sands down to refineries in the Gulf. And the State Department is going through the final stages of evaluating the proposal. That's how it's always been done. But I do want to be clear. Allowing the Keystone pipeline to be built requires a finding that doing so would be in our nation's interest. And our national interest will be served, only if this project does not significantly exacerbate the problem of carbon pollution. The net effects of the pipeline's impact on our climate will be absolutely critical to determining whether this project is allowed to go forward. It's

You will note that much media analysis is interpreting the President's "significantly exacerbate" metric to mean that KXL is likely to be approved given the some of the GHG work in the March draft SEIS that KXL does not make much difference to global emissions as oil sands are likely to be developed anyway.

So I believe that the jury is still out on KXL for this and another reason.

1) Note that the President is clear that the "significantly exacerbate" test comes as part of the national interest test, which is the National Interest Determination (NID) presumably occuring this fall following the release of the Final SEIS. The current draft SEIS found that Canadian heavy to be transported on KXL has 2-19% higher GHGs than the crude oils (Saudi, Mexican, Venezuelan) it would displace at the Gulf Coast. Much of the draft SEIS analysis is based on a 2008 DOE NETL report of GHGs of oil consumed in the USA.

The significant increase in US domestic production in recent years is light sweet crude which has lower GHGs than heavy crude. As US light sweet crude production has increased, it has backed out light sweet crude oil imports mainly from Nigeria, Angola and Algeria. It is expected that by 2014 or 2015, all light sweet crude imports to the US will have been backed out. Then what happens? Basically refineries are configured economically to process different types of crude; simplisticly light sweet crude goes to light sweet crude refineries and heavy crudes go to heavy crude refineries. The US currently requires an export license for crude oil and its practice has been to grant an export license only to exports to Canada. If the US decides to maximize the economic value of its light sweet crude production, the US government will let US light sweet crude be exported to foreign light sweet crude refineries and continue to import heavy crude into the US Gulf Coast where many of the refineries are configured to run heavy oil, However if reducing US GHG emissions is the goal, the US could decline to export its light sweet crude surplus. Domestic light sweet crude would begin

to back out heavy oil imports. While this is economically sub-optimal for the heavy oil refineries, it would make the mix of US crude oil lighter and less GHG intensive. When the President set the metric in the last two sentences of the extract

above, I wonder if the metric is to be applied to global emissions or to U.S. emissions.

Columbia River Treaty (CRT) The U.S. Entity's decision to release its draft recommendation to the State Department as well as to the public has been postponed by a week and is now expected around June 27th.

Richelieu River/Lake Champlain Plan of Study

Richelieu River/Lake Champlain Plan of Study
Later this week the IJC will release the "Plan of Study for the Identification of Measures to
Mitigate Flooding and the Impacts of Flooding of Lake Champlain and Richelieu River", along
with the IJC's recommendations to Governments for implementation of that Plan of Study. The
plan of study contains three separate, individually scalable yet incremental options for study
implementation, ranging from \$5 million to \$14 million and requiring 3-5 years to
implement. The IJC is likely to recommend Option B, which would cost nearly \$11 million and would require approximately five years to implement.

Windsor Hum

A Canadian delegation led by GGD and including the Canadian Coast Guard, DND and Environment Canada is scheduled (tbc) to meet with a US Government delegation in Washington on July 2, 2013 to discuss next steps to address the threat of pollution from the wreck of the US Army vessel, Brigadier General M.G. Zalinski, which sunk in Canadian waters.

KXL

President Obama delivered a speech Jun 25 at Georgetown University setting out how behis plans to meet his promise to tackle climate change. On KXL he announced that "allowing the Keystone pipeline to be built requires a finding that doing so would be in our nation's interest. And our national interest will be served only if this project does not significantly exacerbate the problem of carbon pollution. The net effects of the pipeline's impact... on our climate will be absolutely critical to determining whether this project is allowed to go forward." The National Academy of Sciences released a highly anticipated report Jun 25 entitled "Effects of Diluted Bitumen on Crude Oil Transmission Pipelines". Principle among its findings is that diluted bitumen is no more corrosive than crude oil, nor more likely to spill from a pipeline than any other type of crude oil. This finding refutes a key element of anti-oil sands rhetoric to date. The Minister of Natural Ressources has issued a statement to this effect.
